Commented [CR-J3]: TF: The signposting needs correcting in this paragraph. You mention "firstly" and "finally" but do not mention "secondly".

Commented [PV4]: GR: Make sure you capitalise place names (proper nouns).

Commented [PV5]: WC: Perhaps you could use "Drawing inspiration from Ferguson's (1999) conception of..." "Ferguson his conception" is a Dutchism. You should use the possessive form instead: "Ferguson's".
